Americorp to the Rescue with a New Boardwalk

Every Tuesday morning a small group of Friends volunteers works on some of the routine maintenance projects in the park such as pruning shrubs, weeding flower gardens, and clearing debris from the trails and grounds around Eagle Drive and Winans Meadow. However, there are always projects on the "to do" list that require the Friends to call for reinforcements. For two weeks, beginning on March 24, a dedicated hard working group of seven members of Americorp answered the call.

The Magnificent Seven went straight to work and within a couple of hours car-

ried a truckload of tools, lumber, and gravel up a steep section of the Old Fort Trail to a very distressed area in need of repair. An old boardwalk on the trail was blocking spring water and storm water coming down the adjacent hill from flowing across and off the trail. Instead, the water was pooling along the trail creating a large area of mud.

The Americorp crew planned to demolish and remove the old boardwalk, dig new drainage ditches across the trail to carry off the spring water and storm water, build a new larger boardwalk, and landscape the area with a new grade reversal to prevent storm water running down the trail from reaching the boardwalk. Within the first day of work the Americorp crew made enough progress on the new boardwalk project that they were able to split the crew into two groups in order to offer the Friends assistance with other tasks in the park.



While the first crew continued their work on the new boardwalk for the Old Fort Trail, the second crew painted the storage sheds behind the Trail House, cleared debris from the Dead Run along Franklintown Road, made a section of boardwalk out of old picnic tables and placed it on the Old Spring Trail, planted new shrubs around the Orianda House, and repaired the boardwalk on the Wetland Trail. By the end of a very productive two weeks, the Americorp crews completed at least a dozen projects in the park.

The Americorp crew was made up of young people

from around the country, from Oregon to Minnesota, Missouri and Baltimore. During their stay in Baltimore, the Americorp members lived in the Trail House on Eagle Drive. After their two weeks of work in Gwynns Falls Leakin Park they worked on other park projects throughout the city and then moved on to other projects around the country.

The Friends enjoyed getting to know these young people, thanks them for their work, and wishes them well. The Friends also thanks the Department of Recreation and Parks for coordinating the Americorp effort and the Parks and People Foundation for providing grant funds for the materials used in the new Old Fort Trail boardwalk. These two weeks in the spring are another reminder of the many hands joined together working to make this park the beautiful jewel that it is.

SAVING THE BRIDGE

In the early spring, several members of The Friends became guite concerned about the number of large tree trunks that had been pushed up against and under the footbridge just east of the Winans Meadow parking lot. They were concerned that with the amount of rain we had experienced in the area and the forecast for much more rain, the logs would continue to rise and eventually overtake the bridge, push it out of its moorings, and float it down stream. The City Parks Department was contacted and on April 28, a work crew used heavy equipment, chains, and chain saws to remove the large tree trunks and save the footbridge from being severely damaged. A Parks Department official was heard to say, "Timing is everything."


FRIENDS OF GWYNNS FALLS/LEAKIN PARK ANNUAL MEETING

BGE PIPELINE UPDATE

Discussions continue between BGE, the Department of Recreation and Parks and the Friends about the best option for the gas pipeline through the park. The Friends primary goal is to minimize the number of trees that must be cut in order to have a 75 foot clearing, 50 feet of which will be replanted by BGE, with small trees of course, after the pipeline goes in. Four options are on the table.

On June 3rd, representatives from each of these groups walked what is being labeled the northern route because of its path along the northern edge of the park. Because it takes advantage of existing asphalt road beds, Windsor Mill Rd., Hutton Rd. and Wetheredsville Road, it is the favored route of the Friends although it is a bit longer route. BGE favors

the original proposed route which comes into the park parallel to Cooks Lane, turning east and then running parallel to Briarclift and Winans Way, across Winans and directly up the hill to Rognel Heights. It then follows the edge of the park through the Rognel Heights neighborhood until it rejoins the existing pipeline. The entire route will require a 50 foot permanent clearing so that the pipeline can be inspected from the air. Also, the Maryland Department of the Environment has very stringent requirements regarding water and stream requirements before permits will be granted. The discussions and ultimately the decisions take these requirements into account.

Discussions will continue but as one year has now passed since the pipeline proposal was announced, a final decision will probably be reached this fall.
