

On May 28, there was a gathering of people at the Orianda House to celebrate and honor Heide Grundmann, a founding member of The Friends of Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park and longtime advocate for GFLP (and all Baltimore City parks), the Gwynns

MY LOVE AFFAIR WITH GWYNNS FALLS/ LEAKIN PARK

It all began when I lived near Gwynns Falls Parkway and Hilton Street and went to Windsor Hills Elementary School. I would ride my red Schwinn coaster-brake bike or my barbarian (i.e., ball-bearing) roller skates to the park to climb on the lions guarding the entrance to the Crimea Mansion (those lions are now lolling safely inside the entrance to the zoo in Druid Hill Park) or climb on the black cannons below the hill from the mansion. Bean Hill, at the southern end of Wetheredsville Road at Franklintown Road, was a challenging climb up its steep bare face for us boys (you can't see that bare face today because of the trees and bushes that have sprouted there over many decades). The Gelston Heights Trail now ascends gradually to that peak. Going downstream from Windsor Mill Road on Wetheredsville Road was the Witch's House (actually, the gatehouse for the Windsor Estate), and at the edge of the river was an abandoned stone building, which was probably washed away by 1972's Hurricane Agnes.

After these younger years I had scant contact with Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park. While in college I did play some tennis at the courts on Eagle Drive. And later on, working for the Baltimore City Health Department, I inspected the abandoned stables near Sloman Drive for a would-be entrepreneur with ideas to revive them. Upon retirement, I began hiking with the Mountain Club of Maryland and became interested in leading hikes in Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park. At that time, the Club had a few short hikes in GF/LP on their schedule and I wanted to create some more substantial hikes. I contacted a staff member of the City's Planning Department to obtain trail maps for GF/LP and was referred to Parks and People who gave me a large-scale contour map of the park's trails. The map, published in 1997, had been commissioned by Friends of Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park (my introduction to FOGFLP).

Utilizing the map, I began exploring. Back then in 2002, there was a paucity of trail signage and blazes, and few of the trails on the map were named. At forks and intersections, the contour lines helped me decide which way to turn. Sometimes I couldn't see where a trail broke into another one, and was forced to follow that trail from its other end and then break through. I strategically attached red ribbons onto trees and bushes. After managing to follow every trail on the map, I began to plan out hike routes, originally aiming for 10-mile hikes. Believe it or not, you can create 10-mile hikes in GF/LP with minimal backtracking. In addition to the well-known and better-used trails, there are Wetheredsville Road into Dickeyville, the Windsor Hills Conservation Trail, and the Gelston Heights Trail. If you don't mind walking along some residential streets, there are Clifton Avenue between The Windsor Hills Conservation Trail and the bridge spanning Windsor Mill Road and Winterbourne Road between Morris Road and Chesholm Road (take a look at the present-day trail map). Along Clifton Avenue there are interesting houses which overlook the park. More recently, I've been leading 7-mile hikes. With the diversity of trails, rarely are any two exactly alike. Of course, the same trail is different in different seasons and going in reverse order is a different experience. From 2002 to the present, I have led 22 hikes for the Mountain Club of Maryland in GF/LP and 9 hikes on the Gwynns Falls Trail which included part of GF/LP. Many of the attendees of my hikes had never been in GF/LP, much less been aware of it, despite having been born and bred in Baltimore and its environs. I remind them that the entire forested hike is within the city limits of Baltimore. I explain the strange name of the park and some of the land's history and point out some remains of earlier activity and, of course, I explain that Leakin Park had been a dumping ground, not a killing field.

Annual Meeting

The Friends of Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park held their annual meeting on April 2, 2017, at the Orianda House. The guest speaker was Erik Dihle, Baltimore City Arborist and Chief of Urban Forestry. Mr. Dihle discussed a range of topics related to trees and Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park. Topics included the tree canopy in Baltimore (currently at 20% with a goal of 40%), the condition of trees in Baltimore (50% of our trees are in good condition, 25% are in fair condition, and 25% are dying), invasive education management, vegetation management, the BGE gas line, and much more.

Awards of recognition and appreciation were bestowed on individuals who have contributed greatly to the Friends of Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park and our efforts to improve and enhance our park for everyone.

2017 Awardees -Tony and Sandy Crute faithfully participate in weekly trail work in the park, regularly volunteer for other park related activities, and are always willing to lend a hand when needed. They even bring their own tools!

New Parking Loop Opens

After a year of construction, the parking area on the west side of Leakin Park, near the Sloman Athletic Fields, opened for us just in time for the Herb Festival.

Sloman Drive has been narrowed by a foot and a very substantial wood fence has been installed on the east side to preclude parking. The road forks to provide a teardrop-shaped loop. There are 135 parking spaces around the loop. Off the west side, behind the crumbling stables, there is a side extension providing more parking for the uses of the gardens and the athletic fields.

Across the throat of the fork there is a connector so that it is a connector so that it is possible both to make another circle of the loop and also for the Chesapeake & Allegheny train club members to reach their driveways.

Sharing a Love of Nature

Catonsville native Hillary Nix fell in love with the study of Environmental Biology while a student at Howard Community College and carried that passion with her to Towson University, where she graduated this May. But it was an internship with the Urban Resources Initiative (URI) program at the Carrie Murray Nature Center this spring that gave her an opportunity to learn how much she could enjoy communicating that love to five to ten year-olds.

During her internship, Hillary taught environmental education lessons, hiked the trails, and conducted park clean-ups. She also had an opportunity to participate in outreach for the Center, developing its social media presence and meeting in person with some neighboring community groups. One of the assignments that Hillary especially enjoyed was to develop a program about maple tree tapping at the request of the Center's Director, Corinne Parks. She did background research on the topic and helped to introduce it to children's groups as winter turned into spring.

Director Parks was so impressed with Hillary's effectiveness in her work at the Center that she has appointed her to a position as a counselor for summer camp programs and, for the coming year, as one of the Center's naturalists.

The URI internship program was established in 1989 as a partnership between the Baltimore City Department of Recreation and Parks and the Parks & People

Foundation. Staff members from both organizations propose high priority projects for which they seek interns, who are then recruited from area universities. URI typically appoints 5-10 each for the summer, fall, and spring semesters. For the past six years Ed Orser has served as coordinator of the program.
